No on Prop 36

We all want to live in safe and stable neighborhoods. But the big corporations, right-wing interests, and prison lobby behind Proposition 36 are putting profit over the health of California's communities.

Prop 36 will expand mass incarceration, which will cost Californians billions and will not deter crime.

Prop 36 seeks to increase penalties for low-level offenses like drug possession and petty theft, sending more people to prison and for longer. Every year, Prop 36 would:

Prop 36 will make homelessness worse.

We need to make it easier to get people housed. Jail and prison make it harder. Research shows that even 23 hours in jail is so destabilizing that it makes someone significantly more likely to be arrested again.

Formerly incarcerated people are

10 times

more likely to experience homelessness







People who are unhoused are

11 times

more likely to be arrested

Prop 36 won't reduce retail theft or drug use.

Prop 36 would add harsher sentences for drug possession or low-level theft, especially if someone has previous convictions, but research shows this won't work to stop crime.

Putting people in jail or prison will not fix California's drug problems.

Overdoses in California prisons have more than doubled in recent years.



People released from jail or prison are up to 129 times more likely to die of a drug overdose.




