

108,800 immigrant workers make up **8 percent** of the state's labor force.



United States

30.7 million immigrant workers make up **18 percent** of the country's labor force.



71 percent of the state's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the state's U.S.-born population (58 percent).



68 percent of immigrants **participate in the country's labor force**, greater than the share among the U.S.-born population (63 percent).
