

Immigrant population

Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in Alabama and the United States. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

Alabama



198,900 immigrants reside in **Alabama**, or **4 percent** of Alabama's population.

United States



47.3 million immigrants reside in **the United States**, or **14 percent** of the total population.

There are **18.7 million** children in the United States with at least one **immigrant parent**.



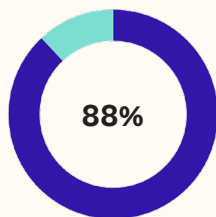

One in ten children in Alabama has at least one **immigrant parent**.

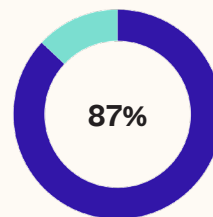

Local community ties



154,900 immigrants residing in Alabama have lived in the United States **for 10 years or more**.



At least **74,400** homes in Alabama are **owned by immigrants**.



13,900 immigrants in Alabama are **entrepreneurs**.



31,200 immigrants in Alabama are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Alabama and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

Alabama

\$8.6B Immigrant-led households **earned \$8.6 billion**.

\$713.8M Immigrants contributed **\$713.8 million** in combined **state and local taxes**.

\$1.5B Immigrants contributed **\$1.5 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$6.4B This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$6.4 billion** in **spending power**.

United States

\$2.35T Immigrant-led households **earned \$2.35 trillion**.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed **\$232.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

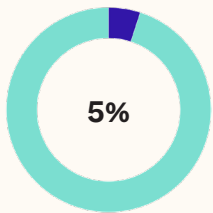
\$419.8B Immigrants contributed **\$419.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$1.7T This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$1.7 trillion** in **spending power**.

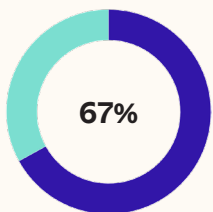

Alabama

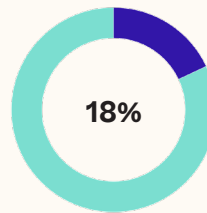


124,900 immigrant workers make up **5 percent** of the state's labor force.

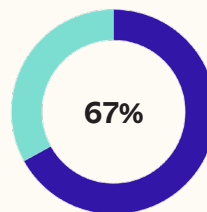


67 percent of the state's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the state's U.S.-born population (58 percent).

United States



30.2 million immigrant workers make up **18 percent** of the country's labor force.



67 percent of immigrants **participate in the country's labor force**, greater than the share among the U.S.-born population (63 percent).
