



400,800 immigrants residing in Alameda County have lived in the United States **since 2009 or earlier**.

57,700 immigrants in Alameda County are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in California and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

California

\$572.5B Immigrant-led households **earned \$572.5 billion**.

\$61.8B Immigrants contributed **\$61.8 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

\$106.3B Immigrants contributed **\$106.3 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$404.4B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$404.4 billion** in **spending power**.

United States

\$2.4T Immigrant-led households **earned \$2.4 trillion**.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed **\$232.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.


\$419.8B Immigrants contributed **\$419.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$1.7T This means immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$1.7 trillion** in **spending power**.



Alameda County




366,800 immigrant workers make up **40 percent** of the county's labor force.




68 percent of the county's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the county's U.S.-born population (67 percent).

California



6.6 million immigrant workers make up **33 percent** of the state's labor force.



65 percent of immigrants **participate in the state's labor force**, greater than the share among the state-born population (64 percent).
