

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Georgia and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

\$59.8B Immigrant-led households earned \$59.8 billion.

\$5.5B Immigrants contributed \$5.5 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$10.3B Immigrants contributed \$10.3 billion in federal taxes.

United States

\$2.4T Immigrant-led households earned \$2.4 trillion.


\$232.1B Immigrants contributed \$232.1 billion in combined state and local taxes.

Atlanta Metro Area




626,800 immigrant workers make up **19 percent** of the metro area's labor force.



72 percent of the metro area's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the metro area's U.S.-born population (66 percent).

Georgia



864,200 immigrant workers make up **15 percent** of the state's labor force.



72 percent of immigrants **participate in the state's labor force**, greater than the share among the state-born population (63 percent).
