Immigrant population

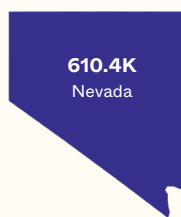
Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in Clark County and Nevada. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

Clark County



511,900 immigrants reside in **Clark County**, or **22 percent** of Clark County's population.

Nevada



610,400 immigrants reside in **Nevada**, or **19 percent** of the total population.

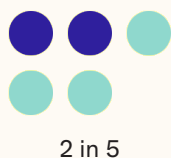

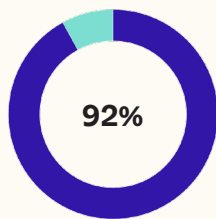

The **vast majority of children** in Clark County with at least one immigrant parent (**92 percent**) were born in the United States.

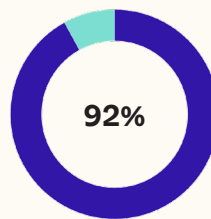
Nevada

Local community ties



456,000 immigrants residing in Clark County have lived in the United States for **10 years or more**.



At least **174,400** homes in Clark County are **owned by immigrants**.



22,200 immigrants in Clark County are **entrepreneurs**.



37,700 immigrants in Clark County are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Clark County, Nevada, and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

Nevada

\$25B Immigrant-led households **earned \$25 billion**.

\$1.8B Immigrants contributed **\$1.8 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

\$4B Immigrants contributed **\$4 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$19.1B This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$19.1 billion** in **spending power**.

United States

\$2.35T Immigrant-led households **earned \$2.35 trillion**.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed **\$232.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

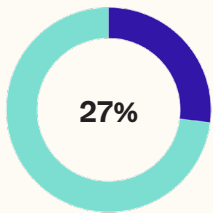
\$419.8B Immigrants contributed **\$419.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$1.7T This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$1.7 trillion** in **spending power**.

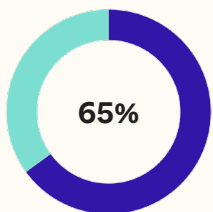

Clark County

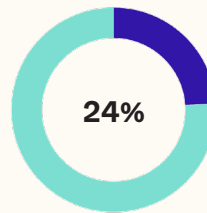


324,500 immigrant workers make up **27 percent** of the county's labor force.

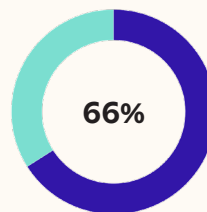


65 percent of the county's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, comparable to the share among the county's U.S.-born population (63 percent).

Nevada



391,200 immigrant workers make up **24 percent** of the state's labor force.



66 percent of immigrants **participate in the state's labor force**, greater than the share among the U.S.-born population (62 percent).
