

Immigrant population

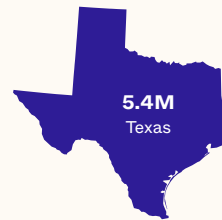
Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in the Dallas metro area and Texas. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

Dallas Metro Area



1.5 million immigrants reside in **Dallas**, or **19 percent** of Dallas's population.

Texas



5.4 million immigrants reside in **Texas**, or **18 percent** of the total population.

Noncitizen population

There are **2.5 million** children in Texas with at least one **immigrant parent**.



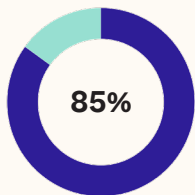

Three in eight children in Dallas have at least one **immigrant parent**.



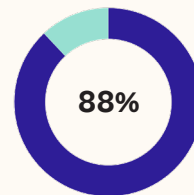

Local community ties



978,600 immigrants residing in the Dallas metro area have lived in the United States **since 2009 or earlier**.



At least **362,800** homes in the Dallas metro area are **owned by immigrants**.



85,000 immigrants in the Dallas metro area are **entrepreneurs**.



185,500 immigrants in the Dallas metro area are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Texas and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

Texas

\$234.3B Immigrant-led households **earned \$234.3 billion**.

\$19.3B Immigrants contributed **\$19.3 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

\$38.8B Immigrants contributed **\$38.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$176.3B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$176.3 billion** in **spending power**.

United States

\$2.4T Immigrant-led households **earned \$2.4 trillion**.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed **\$232.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

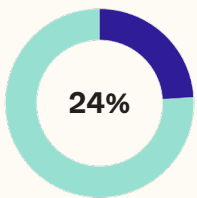
\$419.8B Immigrants contributed **\$419.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$1.7T This means immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$1.7 trillion** in **spending power**.

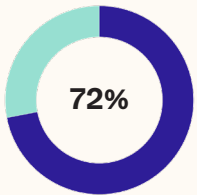

Employment and labor force participation

Dallas Metro Area

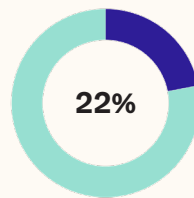


1 million immigrant workers make up **24 percent** of the metro area's labor force.

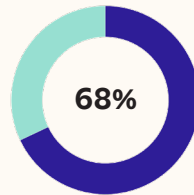


72 percent of the metro area's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the metro area's U.S.-born population (69 percent).

Texas



3.5 million immigrant workers make up **22 percent** of the state's labor force.



68 percent of immigrants **participate in the state's labor force**, greater than the share among the state-born population (65 percent).
