## Immigrant population

Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in Georgia and the United States. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

## Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Georgia and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

\$59.8B Immigrant-led households earned \$59.8 billion.

\$5.5B Immigrants contributed \$5.5 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$10.3B Immigrants contributed \$10.3 billion in federal taxes.

\$44B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$44 billion in spending power.

#### **United States**

\$2.4T Immigrant-led households earned \$2.4 trillion.


\$232.1B Immigrants contributed \$232.1 billion in combined state and local taxes.


This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$1.7 trillion in spending power.

**30.7 million** immigrant workers make up **18 percent** of the country's labor force.



**72 percent** of the state's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the state's U.S.-born population (63 percent).



**68 percent** of immigrants **participate in the country's labor force**, greater than the share among the U.S.-born population (63 percent).
