Immigrant population

Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in the Hartford metro area and Connecticut. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

Hartford Metro Area



159,600 immigrants reside in **Hartford**, or **14 percent** of Hartford's population.

Connecticut



587,500 immigrants reside in **Connecticut**, or **16 percent** of the total population.

21,000 immigrants in the Hartford metro area are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Connecticut and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

Connecticut

\$30.7B Immigrant-led households earned \$30.7 billion.

\$3.3B Immigrants contributed \$3.3 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$5.8B Immigrants contributed \$5.8 billion in federal taxes.

\$21.7B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$21.7 billion in spending power.

United States

\$2.4T Immigrant-led households earned \$2.4 trillion.


\$232.1B Immigrants contributed \$232.1 billion in combined state and local taxes.

Hartford Metro Area




106,000 immigrant workers make up **17 percent** of the metro area's labor force.




69 percent of the metro area's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the metro area's U.S.-born population (65 percent).
