

# How to Talk About Universal Representation and ICE Enforcement

## *Messaging Guidance for the Congressional Hispanic Caucus*

The Vera Institute of Justice (Vera) commissioned YouGov to conduct a national poll and messaging testing around the topics of universal representation and immigration enforcement. The poll surveyed 2,017 registered voters nationally and was conducted from June 26 to July 2, 2026. Vera analyzed the results of the message testing to provide guidance on how to most effectively communicate to different audiences about the right to government-funded counsel for all people facing deportation in immigration court (“universal representation”) and about U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) enforcement and detention, including in response to opposition messaging.

Although not all of the messages that were tested are presented here, this messaging guidance document distills the best messages to use when speaking about universal representation or ICE enforcement/detention and how and when to use them for different audiences, including (1) the general public, (2) Hispanic voters, and (3) voters concerned about the economy getting worse. It also lists some messages that the poll found to be polarizing and less effective for the general public, specifically. In the tables below:

- **Green messages** resonated well with the general public (and potentially resonated with Hispanic voters or voters concerned about the economy).
- **Yellow messages** did not resonate as well with the general public but were particularly effective with Hispanic voters and/or voters concerned about the economy.
- **Red messages** were less effective and potentially polarizing for the general public in the context tested.
