Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in Idaho and the United States. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

Idaho



112,800 immigrants reside in Idaho, or 6 percent of Idaho's population.

United States



47.8 million immigrants reside in United States, or 14 percent of the total population.



72,400 immigrants residing in Idaho have lived in the United States since 2009 or

17,700 immigrants in Idaho are students enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Idaho and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

Idaho United States

\$3.7B Immigrant-led households earned \$3.7 billion.

\$306.9M Immigrants contributed \$306.9 million in combined state and local taxes.

\$546.8M Immigrants contributed \$546.8 million in federal taxes.

\$2.9B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$2.9 billion in spending power.

\$2.4T Immigrant-led households earned \$2.4 trillion.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed \$232.1 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$419.8B Immigrants contributed \$419.8 billion in federal taxes.


This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$1.7 trillion in spending power.

Employment and labor force participation

Idaho United States



72,300 immigrant workers make up **7 percent** of the state's labor force.



30.7 million immigrant workers make up **18 percent** of the country's labor force.



67 percent of the state's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the state's U.S.-born population (62 percent).



68 percent of immigrants **participate in the country's labor force**, greater than the share among the U.S.-born population (63 percent).
