Immigrant population

Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in Long Beach and California. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

Long Beach



116,400 immigrants reside in **Long Beach**, or **25 percent** of Long Beach's population.

California



10.6 million immigrants reside in **California**, or **27 percent** of the total population.

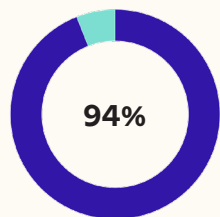

California

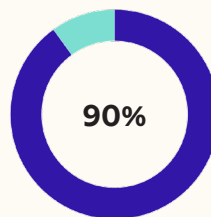

106,800 immigrants residing in Long Beach have lived in the United States for **10 years or more**.



At least **26,300** homes in Long Beach are **owned by immigrants**.



7,400 immigrants in Long Beach are **entrepreneurs**.



9,000 immigrants in Long Beach are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Long Beach, California, and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

California

\$572.5B Immigrant-led households **earned \$572.5 billion**.

\$61.8B Immigrants contributed **\$61.8 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

\$106.3B Immigrants contributed **\$106.3 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$404.4B This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$404.4 billion** in **spending power**.

United States

\$2.35T Immigrant-led households **earned \$2.35 trillion**.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed **\$232.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

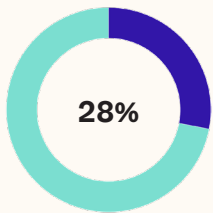
\$419.8B Immigrants contributed **\$419.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$1.7T This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$1.7 trillion** in **spending power**.

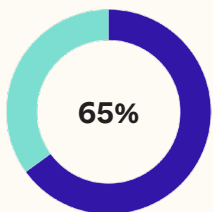

Long Beach

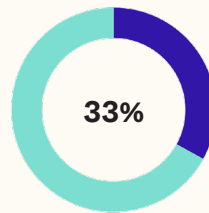


73,600 immigrant workers make up **28 percent** of the city's labor force.

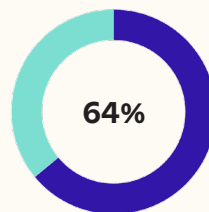


65 percent of the city's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, comparable to the share among the city's U.S.-born population (68 percent).

California



6.6 million immigrant workers make up **33 percent** of the state's labor force.



64 percent of the state's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, comparable to the share among the state's U.S.-born population (64 percent).
