



Immigrants in Minnesota and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

\$23.1B Immigrant-led households earned \$23.1 billion.

\$2.3B Immigrants contributed \$2.3 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$3.9B Immigrants contributed \$3.9 billion in federal taxes.

This means immigrant-led households \$17B have an estimated \$17 billion in spending power.




339,100 immigrant workers make up 11 percent of the state's labor force.




75 percent of the state's immigrants participate in the labor force, greater than the share among the state's U.S.-
