Immigrant population

Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in Marin County and California. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

50,500 immigrants reside in **Marin County**, or **20 percent** of Marin County's population.

California



10.6 million immigrants reside in **California**, or **27 percent** of the total population.

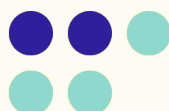

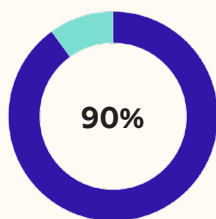

California

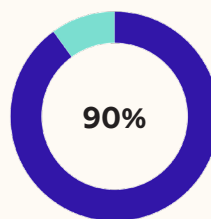

44,300 immigrants residing in Marin County have lived in the United States for **10 years or more**.



At least **16,900** homes in Marin County are **owned by immigrants**.



4,900 immigrants in Marin County are **entrepreneurs**.



5,000 immigrants in Marin County are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Marin County, California, and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

California

\$572.5B Immigrant-led households **earned \$572.5 billion**.

\$61.8B Immigrants contributed **\$61.8 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

\$106.3B Immigrants contributed **\$106.3 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$404.4B This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$404.4 billion** in **spending power**.

United States

\$2.35T Immigrant-led households **earned \$2.35 trillion**.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed **\$232.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

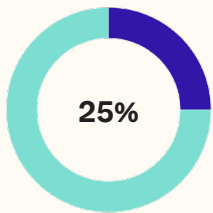
\$419.8B Immigrants contributed **\$419.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$1.7T This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$1.7 trillion** in **spending power**.

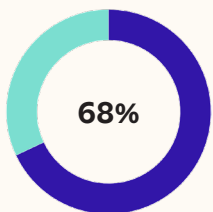

Marin County

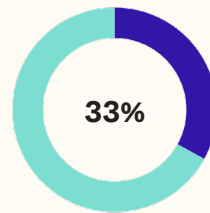


33,300 immigrant workers make up **25 percent** of the county's labor force.

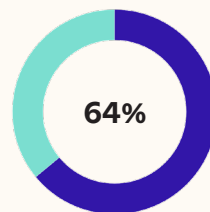


68 percent of the county's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the county's U.S.-born population (61 percent).

California



6.6 million immigrant workers make up **33 percent** of the state's labor force.



64 percent of the state's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, comparable to the share among the state's U.S.-born population (64 percent).
