

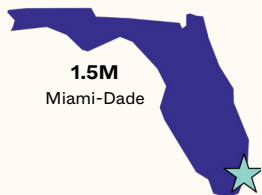

Immigrant population

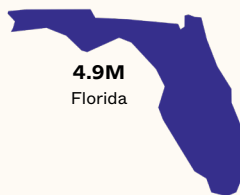
Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in Miami-Dade County and Florida. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

Miami-Dade County



1.5 million immigrants reside in **Miami-Dade County**, or **54 percent** of Miami-Dade County's population.

Florida



4.9 million immigrants reside in **Florida**, or **22 percent** of the total population.

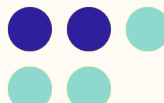

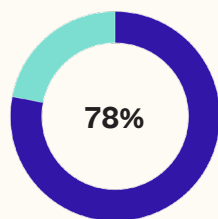

Seven in ten children in Miami-Dade County have at least one **immigrant parent**.

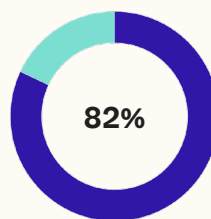

The **vast majority of children** in Florida with at least one immigrant parent (**82 percent**) were born in the United States.

Local community ties



1.2 million immigrants residing in Miami-Dade County have lived in the United States for **10 years or more**.



At least **377,900** homes in Miami-Dade County are **owned by immigrants**.



98,200 immigrants in Miami-Dade County are **entrepreneurs**.



164,800 immigrants in Miami-Dade County are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Miami-Dade County, Florida, and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

Florida

\$207.7B Immigrant-led households **earned \$207.7 billion**.

\$15B Immigrants contributed **\$15 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

\$34.8B Immigrants contributed **\$34.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$157.9B This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$157.9 billion** in **spending power**.

United States

\$2.35T Immigrant-led households **earned \$2.35 trillion**.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed **\$232.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

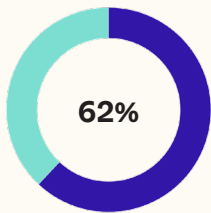
\$419.8B Immigrants contributed **\$419.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$1.7T This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$1.7 trillion** in **spending power**.

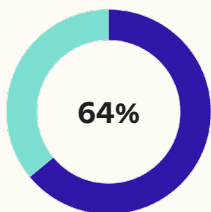

Employment and labor force participation

Miami-Dade County

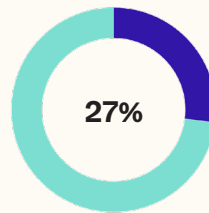


922,500 immigrant workers make up **62 percent** of the county's labor force.

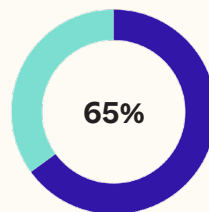


64 percent of the county's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, comparable to the share among the county's U.S.-born population (64 percent).

Florida



3 million immigrant workers make up **27 percent** of the state's labor force.



65 percent of immigrants **participate in the state's labor force**, greater than the share among the U.S.-born population (58 percent).
