Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Tennessee and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Employment and labor force participation

Nashville and Davidson County



69,200 immigrant workers make up **17 percent** of the county's labor force.



74 percent of the county's immigrants participate in the labor force, greater than the share among the county's U.S.-born population (72 percent).

Tennessee



280,700 immigrant workers make up **8 percent** of the state's labor force.



71 percent of immigrants participate in the state's labor force, greater than the share among the state-born population (62 percent).
