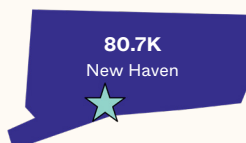


Immigrant population

Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in New Haven metro area and Connecticut. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

New Haven metro area



80,700 immigrants reside in **New Haven**, or **14 percent** of New Haven's population.

Connecticut



570,000 immigrants reside in **Connecticut**, or **16 percent** of the total population.

Noncitizen population

254,300 noncitizens are living in **Connecticut**.

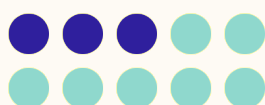

There are **31,000** children in New Haven with at least one **immigrant parent**.

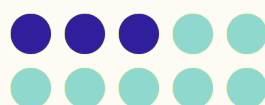

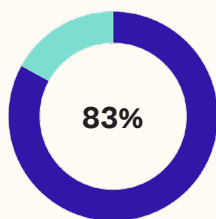
There are **213,000** children in Connecticut with at least one **immigrant parent**.



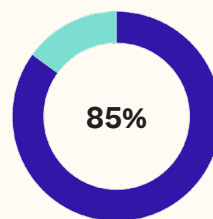
Three in ten children in New Haven have at least one **immigrant parent**.

The **vast majority of children** in New Haven with at least one immigrant parent (**83 percent**) were born in the United States.



The **vast majority of children** in Connecticut with at least one immigrant parent (**85 percent**) were born in the United States.

Local community ties



67,300 immigrants residing in New Haven metro area have lived in the United States for **10 years or more**.



At least **26,700** homes in New Haven metro area are **owned by immigrants**.



3,100 immigrants in New Haven metro area are **entrepreneurs**.



14,300 immigrants in New Haven metro area are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in New Haven metro area, Connecticut, and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

Connecticut

\$30.7B Immigrant-led households **earned \$30.7 billion**.

\$3.3B Immigrants contributed **\$3.3 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

\$5.8B Immigrants contributed **\$5.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$21.7B This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$21.7 billion** in **spending power**.

United States

\$2.35T Immigrant-led households **earned \$2.35 trillion**.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed **\$232.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

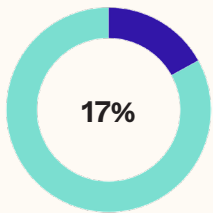
\$419.8B Immigrants contributed **\$419.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$1.7T This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$1.7 trillion** in **spending power**.

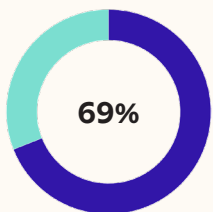

Employment and labor force participation

New Haven metro area

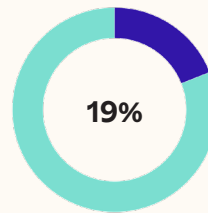


52,600 immigrant workers make up **17 percent** of the metro area's labor force.

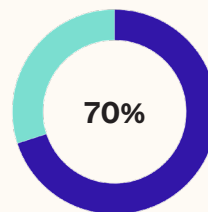


69 percent of the metro area's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the metro area's U.S.-born population (64 percent).

Connecticut



379,700 immigrant workers make up **19 percent** of the state's labor force.



70 percent of immigrants **participate in the state's labor force**, greater than the share among the U.S.-born population (65 percent).
