# Immigrant population

Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in the New York City metro area and New York. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

### **New York City Metro Area**



**5.9 million immigrants** reside in **New York City**, or **30 percent** of New York City's population.

### **New York**



**4.5** million immigrants reside in **New York**, or **23** percent of the total population.



### Local community ties



**4,283,400** immigrants residing in the New York City metro area have lived in the United States **since 2009** or earlier.



At least **1,132,800** homes in the New York City metro area are **owned by immigrants**.



**243,600** immigrants in the New York City metro area are **entrepreneurs**.



**603,400** immigrants in the New York City metro area are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

# Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in New York and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

### Tax contributions\*

#### **New York**

\$235.3B Immigrant-led households earned \$235.3 billion.

**\$31.3B** Immigrants contributed **\$31.3 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

\$43.5B Immigrants contributed \$43.5 billion in federal taxes.

\$160.5B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$160.5 billion in spending power.

#### **United States**

\$2.4T Immigrant-led households earned \$2.4 trillion.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed \$232.1 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$419.8B Immigrants contributed \$419.8 billion in federal taxes.

This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$1.7 trillion in spending power.

# Employment and labor force participation

### **New York City Metro Area**



**3.8 million** immigrant workers make up **36 percent** of the metro area's labor force.



**67 percent** of the metro area's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the metro area's U.S.-born population (64 percent).

# **New York**



**2.8 million** immigrant workers make up **28 percent** of the state's labor force.



**65 percent** of immigrants **participate in the state's labor force**, greater than the share among the state-born population (62 percent).
