Immigrant population

Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in Oakland and California. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.



118,600 immigrants reside in **Oakland**, or **27 percent** of Oakland's population.

California



10.6 million immigrants reside in **California**, or **27 percent** of the total population.


Children and families

The vast majority of children in Oakland with at least one immigrant parent (87 percent) were born in the United States.

11,700 immigrants in Oakland are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in California and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

California

\$572.5B Immigrant-led households earned \$572.5 billion.

\$61.8B Immigrants contributed \$61.8 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$106.3B Immigrants contributed \$106.3 billion in federal taxes.

\$404.4B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$404.4 billion in spending power.

United States

\$2.4T Immigrant-led households earned \$2.4 trillion.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed \$232.1 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$419.8B Immigrants contributed \$419.8 billion in federal taxes.


This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$1.7 trillion in spending power.

Oakland California




73,900 immigrant workers make up **30 percent** of the city's labor force.



6.6 million immigrant workers make up **33 percent** of the state's labor force.



65 percent of the city's immigrants participate in the labor force.



65 percent of immigrants **participate in the state's labor force**, greater than the share among the state-born population (64 percent).
