Immigrant population

Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in Prince George's County and Maryland. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

Prince George's County



244,200 immigrants reside in **Prince George's County**, or **25 percent** of Prince George's County's population.

Maryland



1 million immigrants reside in **Maryland**, or **17 percent** of the total population.

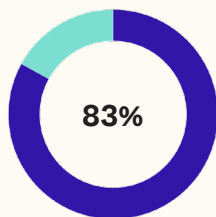

Maryland

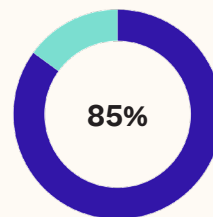

Local community ties



197,400 immigrants residing in Prince George's County have lived in the United States **for 10 years or more**.



At least **63,700** homes in Prince George's County are **owned by immigrants**.



13,000 immigrants in Prince George's County are **entrepreneurs**.



35,800 immigrants in Prince George's County are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Prince George's County, Maryland, and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

Maryland

\$55.3B Immigrant-led households **earned \$55.3 billion**.

\$5.9B Immigrants contributed **\$5.9 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

\$9.9B Immigrants contributed **\$9.9 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$39.5B This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$39.5 billion** in **spending power**.

United States

\$2.35T Immigrant-led households **earned \$2.35 trillion**.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed **\$232.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

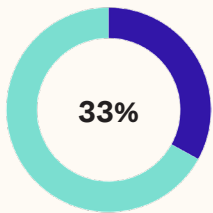
\$419.8B Immigrants contributed **\$419.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$1.7T This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$1.7 trillion** in **spending power**.

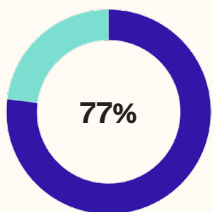

Prince George's County

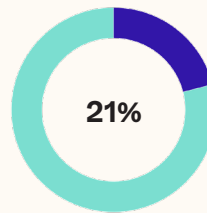


174,900 immigrant workers make up **33 percent** of the county's labor force.

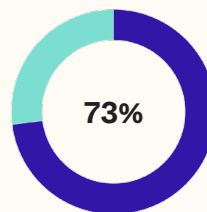


77 percent of the county's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the county's U.S.-born population (67 percent).

Maryland



714,000 immigrant workers make up **21 percent** of the state's labor force.



73 percent of immigrants **participate in the state's labor force**, greater than the share among the U.S.-born population (66 percent).
