

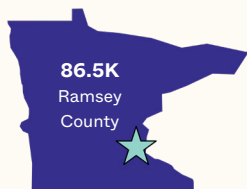

Immigrant population

Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in Ramsey County and Minnesota. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

Ramsey County



86,500 immigrants reside in **Ramsey County**, or **16 percent** of Ramsey County's population.

Minnesota



491,300 immigrants reside in **Minnesota**, or **9 percent** of the total population.

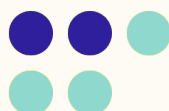

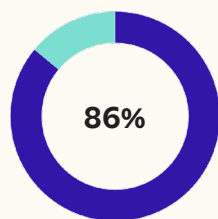

Two in five children in Ramsey County have at least one **immigrant parent**.

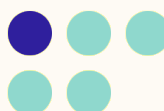


The **vast majority of children** in Ramsey County with at least one immigrant parent (**86 percent**) were born in the United States.

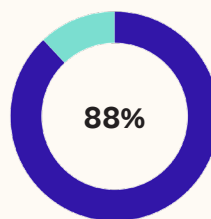

71,100 immigrants residing in Ramsey County have lived in the United States for **10 years or more**.



At least **23,600** homes in Ramsey County are **owned by immigrants**.



2,000 immigrants in Ramsey County are **entrepreneurs**.



15,600 immigrants in Ramsey County are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Ramsey County, Minnesota, and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

Tax contributions*

Minnesota

\$23.1B Immigrant-led households **earned \$23.1 billion**.

\$2.3B Immigrants contributed **\$2.3 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

\$3.9B Immigrants contributed **\$3.9 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$17B This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$17 billion** in **spending power**.

United States

\$2.35T Immigrant-led households **earned \$2.35 trillion**.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed **\$232.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

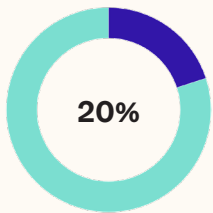
\$419.8B Immigrants contributed **\$419.8 billion** in **federal taxes**.

\$1.7T This means that immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$1.7 trillion** in **spending power**.

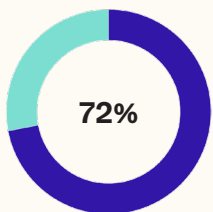

Ramsey County

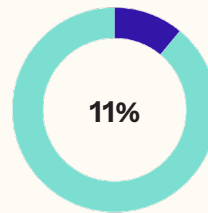


58,100 immigrant workers make up **20 percent** of the county's labor force.

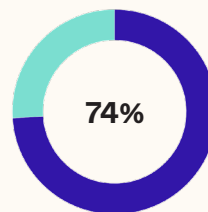


72 percent of the county's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the county's U.S.-born population (68 percent).

Minnesota



342,000 immigrant workers make up **11 percent** of the state's labor force.



74 percent of immigrants **participate in the state's labor force**, greater than the share among the U.S.-born population (68 percent).
