# Immigrant population

Immigrants make up an important part of local communities in Washington and the United States. Nonetheless, no noncitizen is exempt from the risk of deportation, which threatens the stability and family unity of immigrants and U.S.-born people alike.

#### Washington



**1.2 million immigrants** reside in **Washington**, or **16 percent** of Washington's population.

#### **United States**



**47.8 million immigrants** reside in the **United States**, or **14 percent** of the total population.

# Immigrants in the economy

Immigrants in Washington and the United States are indispensable members of the workforce and contribute to the economy by paying federal, state, and local taxes.

#### Tax contributions\*

#### Washington

\$81.3B Immigrant-led households earned \$81.3 billion.

**\$6.5B** Immigrants contributed **\$6.5** billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$16.4B Immigrants contributed \$16.4 billion in federal taxes.

\$58.4B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$58.4 billion in spending power.

#### **United States**

\$2.4T Immigrant-led households earned \$2.4 trillion.

\$232.1B Immigrants contributed \$232.1 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$419.8B Immigrants contributed \$419.8 billion in federal taxes.

\$1.7T This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$1.7 trillion in spending power.




**820,000** immigrant workers comprise **20 percent** of the state's labor force.




71 percent of the state's immigrants participate in the labor force, greater than the share among the state's U.S.-born population (64 percent).

#### **United States**



**30.7 million** immigrant workers comprise **18 percent** of the country's labor force.



**68 percent** of immigrants **participate in the country's labor force**, greater than the share among the U.S.-born population (63 percent).
