# Chicago, Illinois

## Immigrant population

The foreign-born population in Chicago and Illinois represent an important and diverse share of their local communities, many of whom live in mixed-status families.

#### **Chicago Metro Area**



**1.7 million immigrants** reside in **Chicago**, or **18 percent** of the total population.

#### Illinois



**1.8 million immigrants** reside in **Illinois**, or **14 percent** of the total population.

## Population at risk of deportation

829K

**828,800 non-citizens** residing in **Chicago** are potentially at risk of deportation.

900K

**899,900 non-citizens** residing in **Illinois** are potentially at risk of deportation.

### Children and families

#### **Chicago Metro Area**



There are **696,500 children** in Chicago with at least one **immigrant parent**.



One in three children in Chicago has at least one immigrant parent.





The **vast majority of children** with at least one
immigrant parent in Chicago
are **U.S. citizens**.

#### Illinois



There are **741,600 children** in Illinois with at least one **immigrant parent**.



One in four children in Illinois has at least one immigrant parent.



The **vast majority of children** with at least one immigrant parent in Illinois are **U.S. citizens**.

#### **Local community ties**



**1 million** immigrants in Chicago have lived in the United States for **more than 15 years**.



**427,600** immigrants in Chicago are **homeowners**.



**110,000** immigrants in Chicago are **entrepreneurs**.



**183,300** immigrants in Chicago are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

## Economic and labor force contributions

Immigrants in Chicago and Illinois contribute critical tax dollars to the local economy and are indispensable members of the workforce.

#### Chicago Metro Area

\$52.2B immigrant-led households earned \$52.2 billion.

\$5B immigrants contributed \$5 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$9.6B immigrants contributed \$9.6 billion in federal taxes.

\$37.7B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$37.7 billion in spending

#### Illinois

\$60.8B immigrant-led households earned \$60.8 billion.

\$5.7B immigrants contributed \$5.7 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$11B immigrants contributed \$11 billion in federal taxes.

\$44.1B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$44.1 billion in spending power.

## Labor force participation

#### **Chicago Metro Area**



**1 million** immigrant workers comprise 22 percent of the city's labor force, or **one in five**.

#### Illinois



1 in 6

**1.1 million** immigrant workers comprise 18 percent of the state's labor force, or **one in six**.

1 in 5



**68 percent** of the city's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, comparable to the share among the city's native-born population (67 percent).



**68 percent** of the state's immigrants participate in the labor force, greater than the share among the state's native-born population (65 percent).
