Columbus Metro Area





155,800 immigrants reside in **Columbus**, or **10 percent** of the total population.



513,600 immigrants reside in **Ohio**, or **15 percent** of the total population.

There are **72,500 children** in Columbus with at least one **immigrant parent**.

Economic and labor force contributions

Immigrants in Columbus and Ohio contribute critical tax dollars to the local economy and are indispensable members of the workforce.

Columbus Metro Area

\$4.3B immigrant-led households earned \$4.3 billion.

\$383M immigrants contributed \$383 million in combined state and local taxes.

\$794M immigrants contributed \$794 million in federal taxes.

\$3.2B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$3.2 billion in spending power.

Ohio

\$16.1B immigrant-led households earned \$16.1 billion.

\$1.4B immigrants contributed \$1.4 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$3B immigrants contributed \$3 billion in federal taxes.

\$11.7B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$11.7 billion in spending power.

Labor force participation

Columbus Metro Area

92K workers

92,300 immigrant workers participate in the city's labor force.

Ohio



285,600 immigrant workers participate in the state's labor force.



70 percent of the city's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the city's native-born population (68 percent).



63 percent of the state's immigrants participate in the labor force, comparable to the share among the state's native-born population (63 percent).
