# Chicago, Illinois

## Immigrant population

The foreign-born population in Chicago and Illinois represent an important and diverse share of their local communities, many of whom live in mixed-status families.

#### Chicago Metro Area



**1.7 million immigrants** reside in **Chicago**, or **18 percent** of the total population.

## Population at risk of deportation



**790,000 non-citizens** residing in **Chicago** are potentially at risk of deportation.





**1.8 million immigrants** reside in **Illinois**, or **14 percent** of the total population.

**854,500 non-citizens** residing in **Illinois** are potentially at risk of deportation.

**1,371,800** immigrants have lived in the Chicago metro area **since 2009 or earlier**.

**122,100** immigrants in the Chicago metro area are **entrepreneurs**.



At least **468,700** homes in the Chicago metro area are **owned by immigrants**.



**170,100** immigrants in the Chicago metro area are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

## Economic and labor force contributions

Immigrants in Chicago and Illinois contribute critical tax dollars to the local economy and are indispensable members of the workforce.



\$68.7B	Immigrant-led households <b>earned \$68.7</b> billion.
\$7.6B	Immigrants contributed <b>\$7.6 billion</b> in combined <b>state and local taxes</b> .
\$12.9B	Immigrants contributed <b>\$12.9 billion</b> in <b>federal taxes</b> .
\$48.2B	This means immigrant-led households have an estimated <b>\$48.2 billion</b> in <b>spending power</b> .

\$71.6B	Immigrant-led households <b>earned \$71.6</b> billion.
\$8B	Immigrants contributed <b>\$8 billion</b> in combined <b>state and local taxes</b> .
