# Columbus, Ohio

## Immigrant population

The foreign-born population in Columbus and Ohio represent an important and diverse share of their local communities, many of whom live in mixed-status families.

#### Columbus Metro Area

### Ohio



**185,900 immigrants** reside in **Columbus**, or **9 percent** of the total population.



**559,500 immigrants** reside in **Ohio**, or **5 percent** of the total population.

### Population at risk of deportation

**92,700 non-citizens** residing in **Columbus** are potentially at risk of deportation.

261K

**261,500 non-citizens** residing in **Ohio** are potentially at risk of deportation.

### Columbus Metro Area

97K children There are **97,000** children in Columbus with at least one **immigrant parent.** 

Ohio

249K children There are **248,700** children in Ohio with at least one **immigrant parent**.

One in five children in Columbus has at least one immigrant parent.

One in nine children in Ohio has at least one immigrant parent.



The vast majority of children with at least one immigrant parent in Columbus are U.S. citizens. 84 percent were born in the United States.



The vast majority of children with at least one immigrant parent in Ohio are U.S. citizens. 83 percent were born in the United States.

### Local community ties



113,100 immigrants have lived in the Columbus metro area since 2009 or



At least **34,100** homes in the Columbus metro area are **owned by immigrants**.



**10,300** immigrants in the Columbus metro area are **entrepreneurs**.



**33,300** immigrants in the Columbus metro area are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

### Economic and labor force contributions

Immigrants in Columbus and Ohio contribute critical tax dollars to the local economy and are indispensable members of the workforce.

#### Columbus Metro Area

\$7.4B Immigrant-led households earned \$7.4 billion.

\$712.4M Immigrants contributed \$712.4 million in combined state and local taxes.

\$1.4B Immigrants contributed \$1.4 billion in federal taxes.

\$5.3B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$5.3 billion in spending power.

### Ohio

\$21.2B Immigrant-led households earned \$21.2 billion.


\$2B Immigrants contributed \$2 billion in combined state and local taxes.

\$3.7B Immigrants contributed \$3.7 billion in federal taxes.

\$15.4B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated \$15.4 billion in spending power.


### Labor force participation

### Columbus Metro Area



72%

**123,000** immigrant workers comprise **11 percent** of the labor force.



### Ohio



**347,700** immigrant workers comprise **6 percent** of the state's labor force.



**67 percent** of the state's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the state's native-born population (63 percent).
