The foreign-born population in Dallas and Texas represent an important and diverse share of their local communities, many of whom live in mixed-status families.

Dallas Metro Area



1.4 million immigrants reside in Dallas, or 19 percent of the total population.

Texas



4.9 million immigrants reside in Texas, or 17 percent of the total population.

Population at risk of deportation

864K 863,900 non-citizens residing in Dallas are potentially at risk of deportation.

3 million non-citizens residing in Texas are potentially at risk of deportation.

718K children There are 718,300 children in Dallas with at least one immigrant parent.



177,800 immigrants in the Dallas metro area are students enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Economic and labor force contributions

Immigrants in Dallas and Texas contribute critical tax dollars to the local economy and are indispensable members of the workforce.

Dallas Metro Area




947,300 immigrant workers comprise **24 percent** of the labor force.



71 percent of immigrants participate in the labor force, comparable to the share among the native-born population (69 percent).

Texas



3.1 million immigrant workers comprise **22 percent** of the state's labor force.



67 percent of the state's immigrants participate in the labor force, comparable to the share among the state's native-born population (65 percent).
