Denver Metro Area



352,100 immigrants reside in **Denver**, or **12 percent** of the total population.

Colorado



545,500 immigrants reside in **Colorado**, or **10 percent** of the total population.



Denver Metro Area




238,100 immigrant workers comprise **14 percent** of the labor force.



72 percent of immigrants **participate in the labor force**, comparable to the share among the native-born population (72 percent).

Colorado



364,500 immigrant workers comprise **12 percent** of the state's labor force.



71 percent of the state's immigrants participate in the labor force, greater than the share among the state's native-born population (68 percent).
