The foreign-born population in Minneapolis-St. Paul and Minnesota represent an important and diverse share of their local communities, many of whom live in mixed-status families.

Minneapolis-St. Paul Metro Area



390,500 immigrants reside in Minneapolis-St. Paul, or 11 percent of the total population.

Minnesota



479,200 immigrants reside in Minnesota, or 8 percent of the total population.



276,200 immigrants have lived in the Minneapolis-St. Paul metro area since 2009 or earlier.



At least 83,800 homes in the Minneapolis-St. Paul metro area are owned by immigrants.



18,100 immigrants in the Minneapolis-St. Paul metro area are entrepreneurs.



74,500 immigrants in the Minneapolis-St. Paul metro area are students enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Immigrants in Minneapolis-St. Paul and Minnesota contribute critical tax dollars to the local economy and are indispensable members of the workforce.

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



Labor force participation

Minneapolis-St. Paul Metro Area



268,200 immigrant workers comprise **13 percent** of the labor force.



74 percent of immigrants participate in the labor force, greater than the share among the native-born population (71 percent).

Minnesota



324,700 immigrant workers comprise **10 percent** of the state's labor force.



73 percent of the state's immigrants participate in the labor force, greater than the share among the state's native-born population (69 percent).
