116,200 immigrants reside in Oakland, or 27 percent of the total population.

California



10.5 million immigrants reside in California, or 26 percent of the total population.








71,700 immigrant workers comprise **29 percent** of the labor force.




65 percent of immigrants **participate** in the labor force.
