1.5 million immigrants reside in
San Francisco, or 31 percent of the total population.

California



10.5 million immigrants reside in **California**, or **26 percent** of the total population.



148,400 immigrants in the San Francisco metro area are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.



San Francisco Metro Area




943,900 immigrant workers comprise **36 percent** of the labor force.




67 percent of immigrants **participate in the labor force**, comparable to the share among the native-born population (68 percent).
